

# THE POLITICS OF POPULATION POLICY-MAKING IN THE PHILIPPINES: INSIGHTS FROM THE POPULATION/REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH LEGISLATIVE PROPOSALS

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## Rationale (Puzzle)

- The lack of a stable and coherent population policy in the Philippines
- The need to ,deconstruct the Churchcentric explanation for this situation

## Scope (Research Focus)

- The role of politics "policy actors, processes and contextual factors" (Lee et al., 1998) – in population policy-making
- Legislative proposals on population/reproductive health filed in the 13th (2004-2007) and 14th (2007-2010) Philippine Congresses, in both the Senate and the House of Representatives

## **Research Questions**

- Research problem
  - What factors account for the form and direction that population legislation has taken in the Philippines?
- Research questions

Population policy-making in the Philippines

- Who are the stakeholders in the population/RH legislative proposals and what are their specific positions and views on the proposals?
- What advocacy and/or lobbying strategies have the actors adopted to push their legislative agenda?
- » How do the different actors compare in terms of the different factors that could potentially affect the outcome of policy initiatives?
- What factors account for the seeming dominance of the Catholic Church and the morality discourse in population policy-making?


### Field research

  - Position papers/statements of stakeholders (57+)
  - Relevant media reports (150+)
